Just as effectively produced, though touching a more serious note, was Drama Club's production of "Twelfth Night" presented in the Byre Theatre in January. The production later had the distinction of being included in the St Andrews Festival along with 'A Resounding Tinkle'. Catering for allied interests, the Film Club is being well attended, while the Debating Society is now well established, with Charlotte London and Kenneth Rhatigan winning their way through to the Regional Final of the Scottish Schools Debating Tournament. Guided by the tireless Mr Mole, the Chess Club won the Computer Chess competition open to Fife and Tayside Schools, and have reached the semifinal of the "Scotsman" tournament, Congratulations to Helen Scott on being selected to play for Scotland in the Faber Cup.

After the holidays, groups of pupils will be spending weekends at the school's cottage in Glen Tilt, using it as a base for hill-walking and environmental studies


