Rector's Message

Christmas approaches, with its annual contrast between excited preparations for the welcome Midwinter festival and quieter yet powerful expressions of goodwill and hope.

Who cares about the future?

By May of next year, some senior pupils will already have come of age, some by passing a driving test, others by donating blood, yet others by voting in the elections for the new Scottish Parliament. What will be their priorities? Will they expect action on issues such as peace, poverty, injustice, ethical trading or the environment? What insight can be gleaned from the activities of the term now ending?

That we need the break, have deserved it, will enjoy it, there is no doubt. A very full term of endeavour and achievement, thanks to the industry and inspiration of staff, pupils and parents, is illustrated in this newsletter.

Yet along with all this splendid success, are there also signs of goodwill and hope?

If we judge by the number of charity events, preplanned or spontaneous, or by the huge scale of volunteers - by the hundred, and from all years - for all manner of community events or service to others, the answer is obvious. Second Years gave a great example in their Amnesty International involvement. Visitors to school from home and abroad, guest speakers to classes or societies, judges at competitions, work experience hosts, and Her Majesty's Inspectors have all commented most favourably on the positive human qualities, consideration and essential decency of practically all of our pupils. A moving collective demonstration of our capacity for doing the right thing, with goodwill but without compulsion, was given at Ham on Armistice Day when the whole school in both buildings spontaneously fell quiet. Such consideration, such goodwill, give hope.

Why then, if as a school we seem to care so much about important matters, do we sometimes appear careless, even slovenly, in more ordinary ones? Litter, for example. For a generation with an impressive awareness of the global imperatives of conservation, our pupils show shameful indifference to their immediate surroundings. There is no excuse for the tawdry carpet of discarded gum in the playground and street, nor for the trashy trail of paper and plastic marking routes from shops and vans. Within the school and without, yet another new initiative is required in the New Year to tackle the level of littering of their own premises by pupils.

Does this unthinking messiness tarnish our other fine achievements? Are we good neighbours to have? Whose responsibility is it if we are not?

Could we do better, all of us, not because we have to but because we choose to, want to? Will those new citizens vote in and for a truly caring society? Can they show their elders that downward trends can be reversed, setting high expectations in issues great and small? And can they carry through high idealism to the mundane, the things which determine the day to day quality of our lives?

This, then, is a message of congratulation to our pupils which carries also a serious challenge to the power of peer pressure, seeking collective resolution for 1999.

But before then, do have a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!



Debating Competitions

The annual Inter-House Debating Competition, sponsored and judged by the Rotary Club of St Andrews, took place on 15th October. Blackfriars were the overall winners after a very high standard of performance had meant an entertaining evening for all. The individual winners were: Chair, Alistair Brandie; 1st Proposer, Graeme Broom; 1st Opposer, Lisa McFadzean; 2nd Proposer, Hazel Pearson; 2nd Opposer, Valentina Keys.

On 12th November, Graeme Broom and Luke Taylor (S6) were victorious among teams from 36 schools competing for the Edinburgh University/Bank of Scotland Schools' Debating Trophy. Their debating strength had been recognised earlier in the term when Luke won a place on the Scottish Schools' Debating team; Graeme is first reserve. Luke will

therefore be representing Scotland at the World Debating Championships held in London in June.

The Public Speaking Competition provided a very entertaining evening, with the eventual winner being Lisa McFadzean (S4) with Alistair Brandie (S6) as runner up.

Drama

Sixth Year pupils attended the St Andrews Physics Department Open Day in November and had an excellent experience, attending lectures and visiting Laboratories, taking part in "hands on" experiments. They have also benefited from various other lectures for senior pupils at the University.

Musical Notes

The annual Burns Song Competition was held in Kilrymont Hall on 25th November. The singers provided an enjoyable evening's entertainment, enhanced by supporting acts from clarinets, fiddles, clarsachs and recorders. The school Pipe Band performed a selection of Scottish music while the adjudication was taking place. The winners were; Junior Girls, first equal Rowan MacKinnon-Pryde and Louise Botham; Junior Boys, Henry Trotter; Senior Girls, Jenny Lau; Senior Boys, Adam Greig.

Two teams from Madras reached the finals of the Fife Schools' Cookery Competition: a notable achievement, since they were the youngest teams entered. On the day, Henry Trotter and Christopher Lucan (S1) and Jennifer Lucan (S4) gained an award for the best 'Starter' and received a set of kitchen tools and a mini Kenwood chopper for the Home Economics department. The other team of Sarah Eccles and Lynsey Vallance (S2) were runners up. All competitors are to be congratulated for their fine performances against stiff opposition.

Welcome Host

Thirty-two pupils have entered the Welcome Host training, a new venture set up in partnerships by Fife Enterprise and the Scottish Tourist Board. Madras College pupils will attend training days hosted by Rusacks Hotel and the St Andrews Golf Hotel.

INTERACT GROUP

The Interact Group has had a busy and successful session to date.

In October, Erica Ellison took charge of the groups's participation in "The World's Biggest Coffee Morning" and raised £300 for Macmillan Cancer Relief. Twelve shoe boxes were packed with gifts and dispatched for Romanian orphans. The Halloween Fancy Dress Disco, organised by Louise Rolfe with members of the group, was a great success and raised £700 for charity. The group helped the St Andrews Rotary Club and the Arthritis Association sell raffle tickets at the Dunhill Golf Championships.

The St Andrews Rotary student exchange with British Columbia, Canada began: Vicki Sharpus-Jones (S6) departed and her partner, Chris Chatten arrived at Madras, each to experience nine weeks stay in the other's educational system. Luke Taylor spoke to the St Andrews Rotary about his experiences at Camp Ryla in July 1998, when he gained his Leadership Certificate.

In November, 12 members of the group, together with Mr J Bennett and Mrs C Easingwood spent a weekend at the school's bothy in Glen Tilt, enjoying walking, talking and good fellowship.

December has also proved an active fundraising time: tickets were sold for the Kilrymont Rotary Club Trolley Dash and an S4 initiative collected relief supplies for victims of Hurricane Mitch. Helen Watts led an initiative in both buildings which raised £410 for Scotland's only Aids Care Hospice, the Waverley Care Trust. Graeme Broom is the leading participant in a major and exciting project to bid for funding to rebuild a school destroyed in the Bangladesh floods: more news of this as the project progresses.

Thanks go to the range of guest speakers who have enriched the group's meetings over the term: Joe Rosiejack, who spoke on "Interact in District 1010"; Peter Davidson, on "How Rotary Affected Me"; and Mark Teague, "Water Projects in St Andrews", included a site visit to the East Sands treatment plant.



Mathematics Competitions

Results of two of the annual Maths competitions were just arriving as the Summer Newsletter went to press. Madras College were the victors in the Fife Junior Maths Challenge. The four S1 pupils who made up the team, Elaine Goode, Jamie Milne, David Taylor and Dorothy Winn travelled to Auchmuty High School to take part in this entertaining but very testing competition. Thanks go to Mr D Cursiter, Fife Maths Adviser and to the staff of Auchmuty for the staging of this stimulating event.

The Mathématiques Sans Frontières Contest is a truly international event, where tens of thousands of students from all European countries are entered. On the day, teams are allowed 90 minutes to present their draft solutions to as many of a batch of ten or more tough problems as possible. The twist in this particular competition is that the final question is set and must be answered in a foreign language. Thus a successful team must contain not only first rate mathematicians, but also first rate linguists! The two Madras teams, in the S4 and S5 Scottish Groups, both performed very well and both achieved second place, winning prizes totalling £400 for the Maths Department.

Sports Up-date

Football

For the third successive season, the senior footballers have won the Fife Fives at Fife Institute in Glenrothes. The team won their semi-final against Beath High School 3-0 and went on to beat Queen Anne High School 4-2 in the final.

The U13 and Third Year 5-a-sides also performed well this term reaching the latter stages of their respective tournaments.

Calum Hardie and Andrew Murphy from S4 were selected to attend the the SSFA School of Excellence six-week coaching course.

Swimming

The school achieved some notable successes at Fife Schools Swimming

"A" Championships. Outstanding, were Helene Oliver's results against quality opposition in the 12/13 Girls events: 1st place in Breaststroke and 2nd in Butterfly. In the same age group, both Girls and Boys teams achieved third place in the Relay. Other strong individual performances came from Rachel Hood (S5). Lisa Sturrock (S4) and Ashan Jayasekera (S3). Both Sixth Year relay teams were finalists.
