Rector's Message

The contents of this newsletter attempt to convey some of the richness and variety of school life in the term ending. From these accounts we all derive measures of pride, satisfaction or renewed enthusiasm. It is good to reflect constructively, and no-one is going to stop us enjoying the process. In this introduction, however, my intention is to probe below the surface, glance behind the scenes, to find some of the foundations on which the achievements of the school are built. While the views expressed are personal, I believe that they would be shared by the staff as a whole

First and foremost is the daily routine of courses and classwork, well organised and enthusiastically tackled. We might call this the 'grind', the solid essential basis of everything else in school, in which parents, pupils and staff share clear and realistic expectations. In this sensible, repeating challenge, everyone involved should play a part, look the part and be a part. It works, but only if the teaching and support structures and mechanisms are strong, thorough and trusted.

Next is a clear plan for individual, department and school, which makes us think out and agree our goals, aims and, why not, our targets. While we resent external targets being shoved down our throats we set our own ones willingly. A central feature is that pupils are encouraged to make their own plans from an early stage and thus to take increasing responsibility for their own learning as they move through the school. Again, this works, but only when there is massive professional input by the staff in translating the daily routine into series upon series of outcomes or objectives (what we aim for pupils to be able to do).

Then there are our values to consider, what we live for, how we share time and space with others. The interactions, relationships and tone which are woven through each and every teaching period give life and meaning to the subjects we study and the daily tasks set and

completed. For this to happen all the time in the ideal way is not possible. We live in the real world. For it to happen at all, or much of the time, even, is another immense professional challenge.

Because it is so complex and difficult to get the values, the plan and the routine to come together in a coordinated way the fourth element just has to be magic. Worthy targets and subtle performance indicators (how you judge your success) are useful tools in the school workplace but without the flair, inspiration, vision, intuition, wonder or excitement which cross the classroom or crackle the air from time to time, the whole process lacks coherence and zest. Someone once said that genius was 95% perspiration and 5% inspiration. The proportions are probably about the same even for a teacher having a particularly good or magical week.

The constant feature in each of these 4 foundations of success is the professional input of the staff of this school. We have to remind ourselves of this at a time when morale is not as good as it should be because of incessant criticisms of schools from outside. When we read of the various achievements and notable aspects of this term and as we look forward to a busy summer term let us remember that no-one from outside the school's community can write a prescription for our success, it has to come from within. A good way of summing up this view was recently made by Bruce Douglas, a Headteacher in Lincolnshire who stated: "Professionalism is a quality control system. It is the quality control system you use in a complex people-working industry".

So to all partners in the people-working industry of Madras College, may I thank you for your continued support and wish you a very happy Easter.

Burns Supper

The annual Burns Supper was held on 29th January and attracted well over a hundred pupils, parents and guests. The contribution made by singers, musicians and recitation prize-winners was, as ever, outstanding. They were presented with their prizes by the St Andrews Burns Club, whose continuing sponsorship of the competition is gratefully acknowledged.

After the meal, the Rev Dr Bill Henney proposed the toast to the Immortal Memory and in a thought-provoking address gave an eloquent description of the qualities in the poet's personality which deserve to be remembered. Another highlight of the evening was the verbal dual between Jenny Shanks and Graeme Broom (both S6), who proposed the Toasts to the Laddies and the Lassies respectively. The Pipe Band and the Fiddle Group, as well as the soloists, contributed a varied musical programme. Mr Lindsay closed the proceedings with arendition of his latest poem, "Millennial Madras", which took a less-than-serious look into a future in which the school succumbs to crass commercialism. A silver quaich was presented to Morven Chisholm for her six year association with the event and the competitions, in which she has never failed to gain distinction.

The Burns Suppers began in Madras in the 1980s and were initially quite small events. Some seventeen years later, plans are already underway for the Supper in 2000, which promises to be the largest yet.

Unsung Heroes

Just occasionally one hears of unprompted acts of quiet charity and neighbourliness which restore one's faith in humanity. For example, a blind member of the public wrote in to say how much he appreciated the young people who volunteered to read to him one hour each week, helping him with mail, newspapers and societies as well as reading for pleasure.

AROUND THE DEPARTMENTS

Crafty Cooks Club

The club has been very successful again this session, with 40 pupils from \$1-3 staying after school on Mondays to take part. They have enjoyed developing their cooking, baking and craft skills. The programme included a very interesting demonstration given by a former pupil who is now a chef at Gleneagles.

6th Year German Study Day

For the first time, the Goethe-Institut Sixth Year German Day was held outside Glasgow, when Madras College hosted the event in January. Thirty participants from schools over Scotland took part, as well as our own S6 German pupils.

Drama Department

Performances by Standard Grade and Higher pupils are in the process of taking place, where as part of their course work they perform to invited audiences. Theatre trips this term have included Othello at Dundee Rep and Perfect Days.

CSYS Modern Studies

Over the course of the session, the Sixth Year class has enjoyed visits from several outside speakers, including a former judge, a Reporter to the Children's Panel and Steven Paterson from the Procurator Fiscal's office. The group subsequently went to see Mr Paterson in action as Clerk to the Cupar District Court, spending a very interesting morning watching a trial and various other cases.


Many thanks must be expressed to all who took part - speakers, staff and pupils - and we hope that it is the first of many such conferences to take place in the school.

A Great Year in Debating and Public Speaking

A school debating career spanning six years from an auspicious start in S1, came to a climax when Luke Taylor represented Scotland at the ESU World Debating Championships in London on 6th February 1999. In a final contested between teams from England and Scotland, Scotland emerged victors for only the second time in the history of the competition. Our congratulations and admiration go to Luke, on this world-class success.

Luke Taylor (S6) who was part of the winning Scottish team of 5 debaters. Apart from beaten finalists, England, the other strong competition came from teams from Peru, Pakistan, Australia and the Ukraine. In all, 31 countries were represented.

At the Dundee University Debating Union One-Day School Challenge on 17th February, 30 teams from Fife, Dundee, Perth and Angus competed. Two Madras teams reached the final: Shona Morrison and Kai Hopkins (S4) and the eventual winners, Alistair Brandie and Graeme Broom (S6).

For the first time, Madras were invited to take part in the Durham Union National Schools' Competition. Although not placed in the final, Luke Taylor and Graeme Broom found the day an interesting and rewarding experience. This pair of veteran debaters also reached the Scottish final of the ESU Observer/ Prudential Schools Debate, which took place in Glasgow on 16th March: one of four teams from all over Scotland. Proposing the motion 'This House can justify the Assassination of Dictators', they were eventually placed second overall. This was the third year in succession that the school had reached the final of this competition.

In the Scottish final of the ESU Schools' Public Speaking Competition, the Madras team: Lisa McFadzean (Chairperson) Kai Hopkins (Speaker) and Shona Morrison (Questioner) were placed second to the High School of Glasgow in a closely fought competition. In the final, Kai argued passionately that apathy is not the hallmark of today's youth.

The Waid Centenary Debating Competition between Madras, Waid and Bell Baxter took place at Bell Baxter this year, when the host team emerged justified over-all winners and took the trophy. Individual prize winners from Madras were Kate Swingler and Nyssa Duncan (S6) and Hazel Pearson (S5).

In the Courier/Royal Bank of Scotland Debating Competition, the third year team of David Stephens and Julia Higgins reached the semi-finals, while Stuart Ball and Thomas Foster (S2) took part very creditably in the final.

So all in all, this has been another hectic and very successful debating season, as team after team progressed through round after round of competition. The pressure on contestants has been heavy and, if anything, even heavier on their staff coaches, who give so much time to preparation, support and accompanying teams to fixtures. Sincere thanks go once again to Mrs Fraser and Mrs Baughan with the seniors and Mrs Lamb and Mrs Macfarlane with junior teams. The Junior Debating Club has now been taken over by Miss A Williamson and an active and able group of S3 boys, whose efforts are also appreciatively noted.

Books, Books, Books!

Madras is busily collecting Walkers crisps and participating newspaper tokens as part of the Free Books for Schools scheme. This continues until July, so please keep on sending in the tokens.

The School Book Club (Cover 2 Cover/Red House Books) is now offering a reliable service. Pupils are given the opportunity, via their English teachers, to select several times a term from leaflets offering an attractive range of teen fiction, now with a new CD-rom section too. Their purchases also enable us to boost classroom libraries with free books offered as commission.

As part of a recent government boost to school libraries, there will be extra modern fiction, especially Scottish books, in place for Higher Still, especially at Intermediate 2 level.

World Book Day will soon be on us: 23rd April. More news of this soon!

It is also probable that at future Parents' Evenings, local educational publishers, Leckie and Leckie, will wish to repeat their successful 'display and sales desk' as at the S5/6 meeting in November.

UK Schools Intermediate Maths Challenge 1999

On Thursday 4th February, 67 Madras pupils from \$3/4 and 4 from \$2 gathered together to sit this tough but entertaining one hour multiple choice mathematical challenge. Simultaneously, another 120,000 students in secondary schools all over the UK were struggling through the same batch of 25 questions.

Awards are made nationally on the basis of the top 6% gaining Gold, the next 12% Silver and the next 18% gaining Bronze. The school's results were excellent, with a total of 12 Gold, 15 Silver and 17 Bronze awards.

Gold awards were won by Su Liu, Timothy Whitmore, Jerome Dilley, Brett Stickland, Jack Edwards-Fox and Suzanne Bateman (S4), David Stephens, Emily Watts, Toby Gilbertson, Joseph Humfrey and Allan Williamson (S3) and Karen McMullan (S2). In addition, Su Liu and David Stephens did sufficiently well to qualify for the prestigious International Invitational Maths Challenge to be held on 23rd April. Success also came to two of the younger contestants, Karen McMullan and David Taylor, who qualified for the 1999 European Kangaroo on 19th March.

Congratulations to all who took part for their enthusiasm and great effort.

We have been delighted this year to learn that Lee Strachan (S6) was awarded the RM Adam Memorial Prize for achieving the best marks in Higher Mathematics of any Fife Candidate in 1998. The Head of Education came to Madras last month to present Lee with this award and a cash prize.

Other engagements have included S6 involvement with the Holy Trinity Guild Burns Supper on 29th January and Dundee University Music Society's lunchtime concert on 26th February. Twelve fourth year pupils provided a varied programme of musical entertainment in St Leonards Church on 22nd February. In the competition to write a new song for Scotland, organised by the Glasgow Herald, three Madras pupils' entries were commended as amongst the best from secondary schools and the school was awarded a cheque for £100.

Sports Up-date

· Rugby

For the 1st XV this has been a busy and successful season: 14 of the 18 games played to date have been won and even defeats have been close encounters. The squad have performed well in tournaments, with deserved success in the Waid Academy Centenary 7s, when captain and scrum half Ross Methven, in lifting the trophy, was also named Player of the Tournament. This season Ross has played for Fife, Midlands Schools and Caledonian Reds Under-18 teams and been included in the Scotland Under-18 Youth Squad, John Heywood, Stuart Nicol, Daniel Riach and Mike Steven also played for Fife Under-18 team.

The 2nd XV, though willing and able, have been unfortunate in fixtures either against strong opposition or cancelled at the eleventh hour. The key feature of this season, however, has been the contribution made by all squad members, who have trained hard to develop both their individual skills and collective abilities. They have operated as a cohesive and formidable unit capable of playing a very entertaining brand of rugby.

· Cross Country Running

In the Fife Schools' Championships, the school again did exceptionally well. Winners of their respective championships were the S1 Boys, the Under-15 Girls and the Under-17 Boys; the Over-15 Girls and Over-17 Boys took second places. Individual winners were Graeme Noble, S1 Boys and Andrew Lemoncello, Under-17 Boys. Ben Sturrock was 2nd in the Over-17 Boys, Thomas Greene 2nd in the Under-17 Boys, with Andrew Murphy (S3) and Rory Scott (S1) taking third places.

Progressing to the Scottish Schools' Championships at Irvine, the Boys' Under 17 team won the trophy for their event. Individual results of the team were: Andrew Lemoncello, 4th, Thomas Greene, 6th, Andrew Murphy, 19th and Andrew Shanks, 30th. Ben Sturrock was

5th in the Over-17 event and has been selected for the Scottish Schools team to compete in Wales, while Andrew Lemoncello and Thomas Greene will represent Scottish Schools in Donegal, Ireland.

Badminton

A successful season has just ended. The S1-3 Club has been well-supported by enthusiastic players of all standards.

The Senior School Champions are Michael Armitt (S5) and Laura Steen (S6), with Euan Forbes as Junior Boys' Champion. The Junior Girls' Championship will be decided by a match still to take place between Sienna Fernie and Rachael Carr.

Twelve players represented the school creditably at the Fife Schools' Championships, where Laura Steen won a silver medal.

Athletics

Craig McLaren (S4) achieved 3rd place in the Long Jump when he represented Scottish Schools in Birmingham and he also won the Silver medal at the Scottish Schools' Indoor Athletic Championships.

· Hockey

The Senior Girls' Hockey Team has enjoyed a full fixture calendar and reasonable success during this '99 season. They won over half their outdoor games and were runners up in the Waid 7s. Thanks to all the girls for their continued support and congratulations to Linsey Thomson who is representing Scotland U18s in the Home Counties and European Championships this Easter.

Report by HM Inspectors of Schools

Parents should find enclosed with this newsletter, their copies of a report on 5 subject departments. While the report refers principally to the subjects themselves (Business Education, Classics, Contemporary Social Subjects, English and Modern Studies) there are some observations about key strengths and points for action (pp 8-9) which are of general interest to us all. Certainly we have found most gratifying the positive comments about teaching, about the culture of learning and about the extensive range of extra-curricular activities. The points for action will be addressed in consultation and cooperation with Fife Council.

Parent Teacher Association

The Madras College Parent Teacher Association held its AGM on 12th March, at the conclusion of another year of fund-raising and meetings organised to support the work of the school on behalf of all pupils. Retiring committee members and office bearers were thanked and the commitment of all in terms of time and effort was acknowledged.

Some events have proved very successful and been well-supported; for others, despite much effort having gone into presenting a valuable evening, have attracted minimal audiences. Dr Sinclair, as the in-coming Chairperson, led discussion about the level of support from the parent body as a whole for the activities and work of the PTA. While the committee are happy to organise events, they would welcome suggestions from all parents about the sort of activities they would support. The 50/50 Club, which all parents are invited to join, raised the very substantial sum of £900 over the last year. 
