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Most pupils at Madras are not untidy. They keep to the agreed codes and they make an effort to look respectable. A former pupil now working with us says that she finds attitudes on all sides regarding uniform about right. We have identity without looking like the Scots Greys. It is true that pupils look far better when outdoor wear is peeled off, and that parents could certainly help by ensuring that this part of the dress code is adhered to. The hoodies are still the best value in town.

Madras pupils are caring, more even than we fully know. So many individual stories of generosity and personal care come to light each year. Charity events and collections are bigger and better than ever.

Everyone gets involved. One of the Ministers of State who happened to be visiting us on Armistice Day was astounded that the pupils observed the traditional silence at 11 o'clock with no teacher in sight to tell them what to do.

Work? Employers give excellent feedback about people they have taken on, temporary or permanent. The work experience programme for S4, which has just finished, gave wonderful opportunities to hundreds and many highly complimentary comments were received from employers. Glowing tributes swamped the occasional problem.

Standards in examinations are holding up well although we are never complacent and will always strive to improve the “pupil passport” to the land of opportunity in which we live. Recent examinations for S4 showed high personal standards of commitment, organisation and application. Parents reading and helping in the use of the diaries comment very favourably on the normal expectations in homestudy.

That passport is not just the academic attainment, either, but the growth as people, as citizens and neighbours, the achievements that are taken into life. The private and personal lives are not the business of the school, but it is worth

commenting that the immature excesses of a few are not the true representation of the many. In the school's social events we have high expectations and excellent standards, which are only very rarely broken.

What about fitness? In physical fitness we are generally doing well, even though the national picture is bleak. There are literally scores of opportunities (almost all run by staff for no reward) each week for pupils to burn off the excess calories of the national diet. Uptake in clubs, societies and teams is at an all-time high. You can't pass either building or Station Park at 4.30 pm to 5.00 pm any evening or on Saturday morning without realising the scale of team and club events. The

late buses are packed most nights. Those who are not on the route are each a hike home or a

phone away from a parent or neighbour taxi. It is very pleasing also to see so many parents and friends and former pupils attending games, concerts and other events.

And so on, through inter-house events - casts of hundreds enjoying the friendly competition - lunchtime fun(d)-raisers, debates with our nearest and dearest in the East and throughout the land - in talking we never seem deficient. That talk is very productive, such as in the six Year Councils and the Whole School Council now in existence. In the words of the advert “It's good to talk”.

In the following pages, in reading the local press articles or the “Diary”, you gain a wider view of the school, its life and its rhythms, its successes and its hopes. We will never be anything, however, unless we recognise that together we are stronger than as 1940 individual pupils and staff.

So are we just wonderful in everything? Of course not. Slovenly behaviour such as dropping litter in our own back yard is a curse in modern Scotland. Our shame is shared and we should put it right without further ado. If every adult in Scotland looked after his or her corner of the environment, gave the right message of care, economy and conservation - as in several societies

around the world - litter would not be a problem for the young.

Also, we still have the good old split site to make all the activities and work, care and effort more difficult. The School Board, elected members of Council and Parliament and various others are looking at how best to resolve this long-standing problem. Plans are also being drawn up to reorganise the staffing and departmental structures in line with national and Council changes, a process which has taken up much time and energy this term.

The message is that we are getting there. It can be difficult, we have to keep thinking and talking. We have to work together. The good and the successful greatly outweighs the bad and the unsuccessful, but we have to be sure to include everyone possible in the positive side of school life. Finally, despite the politically correct lead given by the Parliament...

So far the most success has come from the Law Society of Scotland Debating Tournament where two S6 pupils (Catriona Kay and John-Jo Ryan) are through to the second round. All the competitions are in their early stages so hopefully this year will prove to be a very successful one to carry on the great tradition of debating at Madras.

Enterprising Maths Competition in the West

The team of Alasdair Downes, Sana Eljamel (S3), Thomas Davies and Sarah Leenhouts (S4) won through to the National Final of the Enterprising Maths Competition on Friday 28th November after winning the Fife Regional heat in June. The venue was Laurel Park Primary School near Glasgow University, a last minute switch of location due to the bad fire at Jordanhill. The team were a great bunch to take – putting in plenty of preparation despite the split-site. We had to leave on the 0656 train from Leuchars and did not return until 1930 – a long

day but no complaints and perfect behaviour. Their poster, completed on the day, is displayed at the top of the girls' stair in Kilrymont Road.

Although we came 23rd of 39, we did well, particularly given the long journey, and had a great time. We even managed a quick visit to George Square to see the Christmas decorations while waiting for our connection home. The dedication shown by the pupils is shown in their willingness to pay £5 towards their travel costs. We should be very proud of them.

Space Camp in Houston

Sarah Dunn, an S5 student of Madras College is over the moon that she has been chosen to attend a once in a lifetime experience at the Scottish Space School 2004. The School will take place at the NASA Space Camp, Johnson Space Centre in Houston, Texas next year.

Sarah is a student of the Scottish Space School Foundation, a world-leading programme managed by Careers Scotland, the Scottish Executive and NASA. It is designed to increase participation and motivation of school students in science and technology and to help young people to understand how the subjects apply to real career choices.

This is the second recent honour for Sarah who won the Royal Astronomy Society's Mars Newspaper Competition in the 14-16 age group, with her "Seeing Red" article.

Davey Rendle, also of S5, has been selected to attend a residential Scottish Space Summer School at the University of Strathclyde.

Everyone truly loved their time there and cannot wait to host the Americans. Let's hope we can offer them a truly valuable Scottish experience.

Whole School Council

The inaugural meeting of the Whole School Council met in the Kilrymont Conference Room in October with a full agenda and much excitement. Five S6 pupils hosted the event in which two democratically minded representatives from each year group attended, from S1 upwards.

The discussion included issues such as future fundraising events, hygiene conditions in the school, and the pressing problem of over-crowding.

This autumn has seen the largest-ever number of pupils taking up pipes and drums with both beginners' classes full to overflowing. That augurs well for the future by dint of regular weekly work from all. While their busy public performing season is over, members of the Piping and Drumming Programme have again been bag-packing to raise funds. This is still and will most likely remain an essential feature as the costs always exceed the contributions paid by parents. However, successful fundraising is good team-work and bonding.

Senior Maths Challenge 2003

The UK Senior Mathematical Challenge is an annual contest run by the UK Mathematics Trust. This year there were 60,620 entries from 1,573 schools and colleges throughout the United Kingdom.

Seventy-one Madras College students took part on Tuesday 11th November. Awards for the contest are set nationally and this year the top 6.3% gained Gold, 14.3% gained Silver and 19.2% gained Bronze.

Again this year our results were very good with one Gold (Natalie Jackson, S6), 14 Silver and 12 Bronze. Impressive results indeed and all contestants are to be congratulated on their effort and enthusiasm.

AWARE Out and About

Fourth year pupils have just completed their work experience placements. We were very fortunate to manage to place nearly every pupil this year. Placements ranged from working in a car body repair unit to experiencing work in the Crop Research Centre at Invergowrie. The majority of pupils enjoyed the placements and feedback from the companies has been extremely positive.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

Congratulations to the 24 participants who have recently achieved their awards, 22 at Bronze level and 2 at Silver level.

The Bronze and Silver groups are running at capacity with 30 pupils. Expedition training is underway at all three levels: Bronze had a successful day's walk early in November on Bishop Hill.

Members of the Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award group began their training for their four-day expedition with a two hour Canadian Canoeing session at East Neuk Outdoors, much to the delight of Nick Cole-Hamilton, President of the Madras College Pirate Appreciation Club. The Cap'n expressed his pleasure at seeing teenagers getting out onto the water. Their progress in just a few hours was remarkable and the mix of fifth and sixth year pupils emerged damp but in high spirits.

S6

Peer Tutoring

We have currently matched 112 S6 Peer Tutors across the school. After their training earlier this session they have been working with individuals and groups of pupils in and out of the classrooms supporting them in their learning. Sixth years are also a regular presence in Kilrymont Road at lunchtimes as well, meeting the younger pupils, helping in the playgrounds, monitoring and trying to reduce litter round the school and immediate community.

Singing Programme

Numbers this autumn have been higher than ever with 75 pupils now taking part. With a mix of vocal instruction and performing in groups large and small, the formula is a successful and safe way to develop the young voice. Mr McGeoch, Principal Teacher of Music who leads this programme, has studied the workings and development of the adolescent singing voice extensively over many years, frequently attending the conferences and workshops of the British Federation of Young Choirs of which the Singing Programme is a long-term member.

Clubs at Kilrymont

Over the term the number of pupils attending outdoor sports practices during the week has broken all records. In the junior sports 30 plus pupils is not unusual at any one practice and on Thursdays on the Kilrymont Road playing fields the total over 160!

Take, in the region of 28 pupils, put them on the playing fields at lunchtime at Kilrymont Road and you have the core of the *Cross Country Club*.

109.com, a lunchtime computing club, has increased numbers of S1, S2 and S3 pupils. Plans are already in place to open another room to accommodate the growing interest.

New club of the term is *The Space Club* run by Mrs Phillips of the Mathematics department.

After the very successful events of late September when we remembered the founder of the school, Dr Andrew Bell, in a series of master-classes, workshops, rehearsals and a concert, music groups have developed their repertoire for Christmas concerts (which brought in over £1,000 at the door - profits going to local charities), mini-concerts (witness the highly apposite venture in Mr Bell's Higher Music class – the 'Wednesday Treat') and beyond.
