# **Tennis Aces**

Madras College boys' and girls' teams achieved a remarkable 'double' when they won the Scottish Schools' Tennis championships last Thursday at St George's School in Edinburgh. Although both teams have won the event previously, the boys' team in 2004 and the girls' team in 1984, 1993 and 2005, this was the first time both Madras teams were able to celebrate success together.

The competition, which started in August 2005, and is run by Tennis Scotland on a knock-out format throughout the school session, ended with the semi-finals and finals played on the courts at St George's on 22nd June 2006.

In the semi-finals the Madras boys beat George Watson's School, Edinburgh 5-1 while Madras girls beat Balerno High School 4-2.

In the final Madras girls completed an efficient 5-1 win over Craigholme Girls' School with the boys finishing 3-3 with the High School of Glasgow. An exciting 10-point tie-break 'shoot out' followed which resulted in a 2-1 victory for Madras reversing last year's final result.

Mary Jack, who looks after both teams, stated that this was a great achievement for tennis in the area complimenting the team members for their commitment over the school session and the competitive team spirit, which was apparent in all the matches played. She also commended the high quality of coaching available to the pupils by Mike Aitken and his support of the Madras teams as well as the availability of courts for matches at the University of St Andrews and St Andrews Tennis Club. She added that the tremendous support of parents, the Rector and the staff at Madras College has helped the teams achieve this historic double victory. No school has ever previously won both boys' and girls' championships in the same year.

The Madras boys' team leaves on the 8th July to compete in the British Schools' Finals at Queenswood School in Hertfordshire having qualified for the fourth year running. Sadly the girls' team lost a close fought match in the final qualifying match against Durham Johnston School, just failing to complete another memorable double for Madras College. June 2006

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On page 5 you can read a contribution to the debate on accommodation and facilities from Professor Peter McKiernan, chair of the School Board. Many of you will have heard and responded to Peter's plea at the Awards Ceremony on 14th June that the parental and community voice in this matter should be heard before all the possible scenarios have been mapped out by this September. Further debate by parent, pupil and staff members at the School Board on 20th June led to a decision very possibly a historic decision - to back the chairman's vision for a new Madras College to be built at the western edge St Andrews. His message and mine of is the same: read what is proposed and make your views known over the summer. The suggested methods of communicating are given at the end of the chairman's article.

The staff, of course, will take a very active interest in these discussions. Some may even express views for or against the School Board's position. However, while all this is going on our fundamental task is to get on with doing the best we can where we are with what we have. Thus, of the four main HMI action points, the one we can least influence is the first – the accommodation and facilities. Most of our efforts will go into actions to improve the meeting of pupils' needs, the teamwork of staff, and the selfevaluation.

The summer term has gone well. The HMI report went out and some of the press coverage reflected the fairness and balance of the document. SQA and third-year examinations were very well run. The new timetable has started successfully, despite the many staff shortages we currently endure. New staff have been allocated to 12 vacancies and interviews

are taking place right up to the end of term for several long-delayed appointments. Senior pupils in both buildings (S3 in Kilrymont and S6 in South Street) have taken up the challenge of involvement and responsibility with gusto and skill. The big events we still put on at the end of session are in full swing, well-attended and give evidence of the spirit and quality that we strive to maintain. Many team and individual achievements are noted elsewhere, although the feat of the senior girls and boys in winning the national tennis trophies (never before achieved by a Scottish school) deserves special mention.

It has been a very good term, though some batteries will enjoy recharging in the lazy, hazy days of summer ahead. We trust that you, our valued partners in the joint enterprise, also enjoy a pleasant and invigorating summer.

# Staff Retirals

We have a large group of colleagues who retire this session. This is the moment to record our appreciation to them. Details are given in ascending order of lengths of service to Madras, not seniority of status.

Ms Madge Denwette, who joined the Music department in 1993, retired at Easter after a long struggle against illhealth.

Mrs Fiona Towns, who came as Principal Teacher of Guidance in 1991 and held the post apart from two short spells as Assistant Rector in 1996 and 1997, retires at the end of session.

Mrs Gillian Macfarlane, who joined the English department as assistant Principal Teacher in 1987 (continuing her management input into the department in the McCrone era since 2003) is due to retire at end of session.

Mrs Claire Easingwood, who first joined us in 1985, also as APT English, then went to Kirkcaldy High as Principal Teacher in 1987, before returning as Assistant Rector in 1991 (Depute Rector since 2003), is due to retire at end of session.

Mr Alastair MacCrimmon, who came in 1978 as Teacher of Technical Subjects,

then in 1982 became APT of Resources, a whole-school post, which continued in the McCrone era as PT1, retired in May.

Dr Robin Waterston, who came in 1978 as Teacher of Maths, became PT of Maths in 1981, held the post since then with two spells as acting AHT (in 1990) and acting Depute Rector in 2005-06, retired earlier this month.

Mrs Judith Harding, who came in May 1974 in the time of Dr Thompson, as teacher of Modern Languages, and became Senior Teacher in 1990, a post she demitted after the McCrone changes in 2003, retires at the end of session.

Together these "Magnificent Seven" colleagues have made a huge contribution to this school. Their 173 collective years of service in various roles and remits illustrate well the "long game" that we are playing in Madras. They symbolise the professionalism on which good learning is based, and we should laud them, thank them, and wish them well in their futures.

## **Staff Changes**

Some terms are quiet for staffing changes, others busy. Then there was this term!

Mrs Molife (Maths) moved to a permanent post in West Lothian at the start of May, and Mrs Smart was appointed acting head of the Special Education Department. In June the main features were: Mr Nisbet was appointed Head of Maths; Mr Latona (Business and Computing) returned from secondment; Mrs McNeill (Modern Studies) who had been on secondment since the autumn was appointed Head of Social Subjects at Kirkland; and Mrs Clark was appointed as PT of Guidance.

We also say farewell to Mr Cowieson (Drama) who completed his probationary year at Madras, to Miss Morison (Biology) who takes up a post in August at Gracemount in Edinburgh, and to Mrs Binnie (Pupil Services) who takes up a post in Cupar after the summer. Mrs LA Brown (Depute) will be on secondment to the Scottish Education Department for 18 months from August, working with a team developing national assessment strategies.

In August a number of new staff will take up post following interviews in the last few days.

# Music News

Here is the potted Music News for session 2005/06.

Last summer seems such a long time ago, but it is enjoyable to look back on the mixture of sun, rain and experiences we encountered on the third amazing Music Department tour organised and led by Ruth Craib. Involving eighty pupils and ten staff this was a superb tour - again and will be remembered for the things we did and the people we met along the way. The people of Strasbourg deserve a special mention for their kindnesses and instant empathy on the occasion of our visit - on July 7th. That meant a lot to us and underscored the value of maintaining and further developing international accord through music. Something to ponder at this season of the year.

As Monty's buggy bounced down the 18th fairway of the Old Course after his Dunhill win, he overtook the (retreating) Madras College Pipe Band whose honour it was to play out the competition. This put the seal on an incredible season for the band involving school events, conferences, university events, an appearance for charity at the Anstruther Lifeboat Gala (worth going just for the brilliant kipper rolls, but what about the aquanautics, aerobatics and bungee jumping too?), a bandstand event, a high profile birthday party and, by the way, a tour to foreign parts too.

Singers had the opportunity to receive coaching at National level when the Music Department organised a 'Test Drive NYCoS' day. Accuracy and strict attention to detail underlined and reinforced many of the lessons taught in school - lessons which at once demonstrate the high expectations of staff and the ability and desire of pupils to match and exceed these same expectations. Later in the term the school was also fortunate enough to host a visit of the Scottish Ensemble as pupils from across the region gathered for a day of intensive but highly enjoyable string workshops.

November saw the poignant Remembrance Sunday Parade and Service in St Andrews accompanied by the Brass Ensemble and with calls rendered by our trumpeters. Later that day the same calls soared out over the crisp air at the service held on the ancient hilltop church of Moonzie near Cupar.

Privileged to be invited, the Singers gave a moving rendition of Rutter's Clare Benediction to bring the St Andrews Day Service to a close in Holy Trinity Church.

The Christmas Concert – a sell out involving 245 talented pupils (how can the numbers keep increasing?) with two wind bands, two orchestras, two choirs, three soloists, two chamber groups -'Blackfriars Quartet' which has truly come of age, the nascent 'Class Brass' and nearly, but not quite, 'a partridge in a pear tree' sums up the level of involvement and commitment of staff and pupils alike. In the words of one singer who showed signs of stage-fright a few weeks earlier: "I thought I would be scared but I got such a buzz. I'd like to do a solo next time, please!" Parental feedback was strong too although there have been no offers of solos so far.

Seasonal extras also involved a concert for Fife Society for the Blind and an appearance of Class Brass at a local supermarket as Old Folks sat down to enjoy festive cheer. As I write bands are active bagpacking and playing to raise much-needed funds for their next venture. It never stops.

### **Peer Mediation** A Brief Outline

At Madras we are constantly looking at ways to develop our support for pupils. The school has a well established tradition of *Peer Tutoring* where S6 pupils are directly involved in helping others. We now look to develop *Peer Mediation*, using trained S3 pupils to support S1. Here is a brief outline to the new support system.

Peer Mediators are trained pupils who can help other pupils to sort out conflicts - arguments, fall-outs, threatening behaviour, and so on. Peer mediators encourage those involved in the conflict to identity solutions and take responsibility for their actions. It is voluntary and works best when there are two clearly identified people involved in the conflict. How does it work? Here's a typical example:

'Abbie' and 'Beth' have fallen out, big time. Having been pals for a while, they are now behaving towards each other in ways that are causing them to be upset and are getting into trouble. Abbie approaches the school's peer mediators for help. Firstly the mediators take time to listen to Abbie's concerns and to decide if mediation is appropriate. With Abbie's agreement they approach Beth and explain that there is a problem and that mediation may be a useful way to sort it out. Beth puts her side of the story and then, if both girls agree, they meet with the mediators. The mediation process aims to allow each to say how she feels, to avoid looking backwards and accusations, and to work towards a mutually agreed solution.

Peer Mediation has been shown to help reduce pupil-pupil conflict and to reduce the demands on staff to deal with lowlevel incidents. It encourages responsibility-taking and shows pupils that the solution to their problems often lies in their own hands.

### Madras Business Enterprise Group

The group has been running the Fairtrade tuck shop at Kilrymont Road and has used some of the profits from that enterprise to fund registration to Fife's Natural Connections scheme.

The award has 6 components all based within the outdoor environment and aims to challenge pupils in the areas of caring for nature, working together, adventure skills, finding your way, journeying, helping others and finally, making connections.

The pupils have been working at adventure skills this term that have included sessions kayaking and open canoeing. They will also sail, bike and take part in archery before looking at other sections of the award after the summer holidays.

## New School Options for Madras College

For five years, the Madras School Board has led a campaign to improve the building fabric of our school. It has held numerous forums, taken soundings from parents and pupils, consulted widely in the local community, commissioned original research, made presentations to interested stakeholder groups and liased continuously with agents of Fife Council. This fruitful work led to the generation of several options including the status quo, refurbishment of one or both sites of the college in the town of St Andrews, a refurbishment of one site in St Andrews and a new build in the bridgehead area and a new build on the western approaches of St Andrews.

For the last few years, the Board has occupied a neutral position on these options, preferring instead to sustain its lobbying to achieve action of any kind. In May 2005, the Council announced its decision 'to redesign and relocate Madras College on one site'. In May 2006, following an HMI report on the school that was highly critical of the negative impact of the 'dispersed accommodation' on various aspects of school life, Fife Council officers began to examine the options in a systematic manner with a view to reporting to the Head of Education in September 2006.

In order to encourage a broader public dialogue, the Board has chosen to declare its preference for a new-build, single-site school on the western approaches. Its reasons are threefold. First, through a partnership approach (e.g., the University, SportScotland, local developer, local merchants), this option is more **cost** effective than any competing option and avoids the peculiarities and complications of a Public-Private Partnership (PPP). Second, the **demographic** projections suggest a dramatic fall in primary school rolls over the medium term. The projected roll for Madras over the medium term is about 1400. Neither of the existing sites would be adequate for a school of this size, and if both were involved it would still leave the school as a split site. The only 'clean' solution is a new build on a larger green-field site.

Finally, a new build to the west of the town would enhance the community aspects of the project in several ways. A partnership approach would deliver services greater than those available through any individual project. For instance, sports facilities could be shared with the University and the community, so bringing a 50 metre pool, 6 indoor tennis courts, two large sports halls, acres of playing fields-both natural and all-weather, floodlit facilities and specialised coaching. Sensitive development in the west could include a relief road that brings traffic directly to the school entrance, cutting journey times and avoiding the environmental pollution and erosion of road surfaces associated with large buses navigating the small streets within the town. The western location would also make far better sense given that 65% of the school roll arrives daily by bus from the west and north of the catchment. A new school could be state of the art in terms of ecological, environmental and renewable components. Additionally, new food halls with healthy organic fare could provide employment for local

merchants and their suppliers. The release of the Kilrymont site could also assist Fife Council to meet its targets for the building of affordable housing in St Andrews.

# Duke of Edinburgh's Award

It has been a record-breaking year for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award group. We had the largest number in recent memory participating, a total of 66 pupils were actively involved in actually going out on expedition this term.

There were also an amazing number of certificates awarded. Since last June there have been 21 pupils given their Bronze award, 18 the Silver, and a cool 3 the Gold level.

Scotland has continued to test the pupils' determination and perseverance. At the date of writing four of the five expeditions have been completed. In that time we've had heat waves, torrential rain and sleet. Fortunately no flash flooding this season through some rivers were challenging.

A massive thanks must go to the staff involved, without whom the award just would not run. Their hard work and perseverance is much appreciated especially in rising to the ever-present challenge of 'the paperwork'.

Well done to all our expeditioners and a reminder to all Bronze and Silver level participants that their current level must be finished/completed by the start of the October holiday to be able to continue on to the next level.

## Geographical Fieldwork

Session 2005-2006 has seen a significant increase in Geographical fieldwork. S1 has benefited from a new course involving pupils in fieldwork in and around the Kilrymont Road building. S3 took part yet again (with approximately 120 pupils, 6 members of staff and 3 Moffat and Williamson coaches!) in the Highland fieldwork day, which is an essential part of Standard Grade Geography. S5 and S6 visited the Lake District and Pennines for the annual residential weekend's fieldwork and the Higher Managing Environmental Resources class had another successful weekend in the Cairngorms National Park in April. The urban fieldwork day to Dundee was reinstated for the Higher Geography class and also included a study of the Tentsmuir dune system.

There are, however, other changes afoot. Standard Grade Geography pupils are being offered a week's visit to Iceland during the coming October holiday to study volcanic and glacial landscapes. Higher and Advanced Higher fieldwork is being focussed on the Yorkshire Dales and another new initiative is Higher Travel and Tourism's visit to the Highlands in September to study all aspects of the Scottish tourism industry.

The geography department has also been involved with three-day activities – the 'Highland Adventures' excursion, and with the 'Highland Tour' for the Japanese exchange pupils and their hosts. This year we are going to Aviemore in July to show our visitors the variety and quality of Scottish landscapes and the recreational experiences on offer.

We are considering going into business with our tours. Any offers?

### Latin Recitation Competition

The 49th Kiel exchange left on 24th June and returned on 3rd July. Accompanying teachers were Mr Irving and Mrs McCartney (party leader) and 25 pupils from S4 and S5. Next year sees the 50th exchange visit when the Germans return to Scotland. There will be several events organised to celebrate what is one of the longest running exchanges in Scotland, if not the longest! Watch this space!

#### • Fife Festival of Languages

Douglas Latto (2K) won the competition to design a poster for the Fife Festival of Languages which took place in June. He was awarded an individual prize and a prize for the department. Mrs Drylie accompanied 21 pupils to this festival on 27th June.

# What's Going On?

On Thursday 22nd June a substantial group of parents with their children were introduced to Fife's new pilot, "What's Going On?" The 10-period course, which will take place in August and September with groups of S3 pupils, aims to coach assertive behaviour through the following units: What are you like? What are you thinking? Body Language. Talk and Compromise and Negotiation.

The parents were welcomed by Mrs L A Brown and Mr C Mackay (Depute Headteachers) who outlined Fife's plans; the parents then went into classrooms and were offered mini-lessons as tasters to the course (observed by their sons and daughters!!). Mrs E Payne (English) and Miss M Russell (Guidance) enjoyed teaching their new 'pupils'.
