Rector's Note

It is a great privilege and honour to have taken over the helm of Madras College from Lindsay Matheson. It would be accurate to say that Lindsay and I hit it off immediately; we have a similar view of education, of the need to maintain traditions and standards, while at the same time keeping abreast of the everchanging nature of education. In March I met with a group of sixth year pupils and was impressed with their sense of pride in being students of Madras. They felt hurt about criticism that had been levelled against the school and were clear that it did not reflect their experience. Their loyalty to Madras was evident, as was their sense of injustice. During the changeover week it became very clear that Lindsay Matheson was held in high esteem. His leadership and vision has developed a school with a sense of purpose and with the capacity for change. In this work Lindsay has shown sensitivity and compassion and he has balanced tradition with the need to respond to the new and increasing demands being placed on our education service. He has developed a school that is forward looking and mindful of the needs of all pupils at Madras.

In my experience schools are about 3 things: achievement, ethos and partnership.

Scottish Parliament Visit



The Modern Studies Department has close links with the Scottish Parliament through Intermediate 2, Higher and Advanced Higher visits to it, visits to the school by MSPs and help and advice to Advanced Higher pupils in the research stage of their dissertations.

In March of this year a group of six S5/6 pupils represented Mid Scotland and Fife on a full day of seminars and discussion around the issue of 'Young Women in Politics'. Later in the month a group who visited the parliament were taken 'behind the scenes' to the offices of MSPs and met and were photographed with the 'then' First Minister. Typical of our subject that he has now been replaced and our glory was short-lived!

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Achievement is much broader than attainment measured in exam success, important though this is. It encompasses the whole range of experiences that make up school life and in the Madras excels.

Ethos is about the relationships and values that underpin all work we do at Madras. A positive ethos is evident in many ways; the welcome, friendly feeling that I experienced from my very first visit to Madras and the purposeful, productive relationships that exist in classrooms, corridors and throughout the school. Madras is seen as a caring place in which there exists fairness and equality, a sense of pride in our achievements and successes and an understanding about the need to work together to achieve our common goals.

Partnerships provide the context within which we work. All pupils appreciate the support, encouragement and praise that come from both school and home. There is no doubt about the beneficial effect of this very important and necessary mutual support. Partnership with the community in its many guises is important for Madras. Community use of Kilrymont is impressive and it is wonderful to see the extent to which groups make use of the facilities. Work experience provides a valuable insight for fourth year pupils and we are grateful to all the providers who contribute to this worthwhile activity. We are grateful for our continuing links with the University of St Andrews, Elmwood College, RAF Leuchers, The Byre Theatre and to the many organisations in North East Fife with whom we are associated.

Over the past 6 weeks I spent as much time as possible visiting classes and being about the school at interval and lunchtime. In classrooms I have experienced a high quality of teaching, I have noted positive relationships between staff and pupils leading to a productive learning environment and I have spoken to all years at assemblies setting out my expectations for behaviour, school uniform, school work and attainment. To support this we will be directing our attention into 3 broad areas next session under the heading of Learning Together in Madras College,

these 3 areas are praise, regards and the recognition of success, Behaviour for Learning, and Learning and Teaching.

I have come into a school that is strong, that justifiably enjoys a proud reputation not only in Fife but throughout Scotland, a school that knows itself, understands what it is good at and recognises the changes that are necessary for its continued development. This is a school that cares about its pupils, staff and community. It is well placed to face the future with confidence. The credit for this lies with the leadership, professionalism and dedication of Lindsay Matheson, his senior management team and to all members of staff at Madras.

Four members of staff retire at the end of term, who between them have an accumulated total of 90 years service to Madras. To Miss Mary Jack, Mr Alan McGeoch, Mrs Grace Wright and Miss Jean Robertson we pass on our thanks and very best wishes for long and happy retirements.

School Exchange Began 50 Years Ago

In June 2007 the exchange between Madras College, St Andrews and the Kieler Gelehrtenschule in Schleswig-Holstein, Germany will mark its 50th anniversary. It is as far as is known the oldest continuing exchange between two individual schools in two countries. To celebrate this half-century of friendships – approximately 1500 German and Scottish families have been directly involved – an anniversary Ceilidh was held on Saturday 30th June in Madras College's South Street building during this year's visit.

The 'Kiel Exchange' or 'Schottenaustausch' started as a result of correspondence between two historians, Dr John Thompson, who in 1955 had just become Rector of Madras College, and Professor Karl Dietrich Erdmann who had recently become Professor of Modern History in Kiel University. In Madras College, then a senior secondary school, Dr Thompson had introduced the study of German instead of French as first foreign language.

In 1958 the first group of 28 Madras pupils travelled to Kiel with the principal teacher of Modern Languages, Mr Ian M Hendry. Half the pupils had entertained their German partners the previous year, and the other half, from the year group below, would be meeting them for the first time — a principle that continues to this day, so that the exchange always has continuity.

There have been many adaptations to the exchange programme, but it continues to be regarded as the highlight of their school career by many participants. A lot of people who met on the exchange have remained in contact over the years and decades. The exchange has been led by a succession of members of staff and to date over the periods of service of 4 Madras College and 5 KGS head teachers.

Seven out of the nine pupils in the Madras singing and instrumental team were placed in the Fife Burns Competition. The three singers who gained either 1st or 2nd places then took part in the National Burns Competition gaining two 2nd places at this level and also towing the Fife singing team to victory.

Pipe Band

The stirring sound of the pipes and drums of Madras College was again to be heard at the Summer Concert and the sight and sound of first the drum fanfare and then the 16 pipers marching up the centre isle in stately procession is one not to be forgotten. While preparing for their forthcoming tour to Belgium with the Senior Wind Band and the Orchestra, the Pipes and Drums have already had an unusually busy and varied season. The Mini-Band (usually about 7 or 8 players) has played at events ranging from the re-opening of Costa, a Rotary Club (Kilrymont) concert and a birthday party, while the full band (of 20 to 30 players) has recently played for a wedding reception and the annual Alumni Reunion Ball at the University. Both bands are for hire at very reasonable rates! While donations come in from time to time (and £500 from the Rotary was a most generous gesture), more money is needed to update the instruments and kit so that the Piping and Drumming Programme may continue to flourish in future years.

Talent Show

The annual Talent Show attracted over 60 acts; S1 to S6 reduced down to 15 for the performance in March and the event raised over £800 for Comic Relief.

Joint winners were Iain Sutherland and Andrew Scott (S5), and Nicola Rayner and Gabriella Da Cruz Welsh (S6).

Singing Programme

At the end of May the Singing Programme welcomed the international singer, voice teacher and choral conductor, Edward Caswell. In 4 workshops he prepared with the singers the medley 'Rodgers and Hammerstein on Broadway' which was performed at the school concert. It is hoped he will return in the Autumn to work with the singers on choruses from Handel 'Messiah' to be performed jointly with St Andrews Chorus on November 24th.

Music Tour 2007

On Friday 6th July 82 pupils from the Wind Band, Orchestra and Pipe Band leave for a one-week music tour, staying at Lo in Belgium. This is the fourth biannual tour organised by Mrs R Craib. the woodwind instructor, and the third for many of the pupils involved this year, which goes to prove how enjoyable and popular the itinery is. This year all 3 groups are performing 4 concerts in a variety of venues including Ostend Bandstand and Ypres Market Square. The group will be sightseeing in Bruges, Bowling in Ypres, swimming at Sun Parks in Ostend and visiting a theme park. The group will also be taking part in the Menengate service where Iain Sutherland (S5) will play The Flowers of the Forest as a piping solo.

Cabaret - April 2007

'This place gives me the heebie-jeebies' – Far from being a remark heard from the mouth of Mr Dewar alone in a dark alleyway on one of his more hectic days, this is in fact the opening line of what has proved to be one of the most exciting and diverse productions staged by the Quad Theatre Company to date.

Both written and directed by Patricia Esler, 'Cabaret' is a remarkable production for the energy and vivacity of its performers, the colour and variety of each of its amazingly self-contained scenes and, not least of all, the sheer range of talent employed by the actors, dancers and musicians involved. Following as a sequel to the original 2006 production of 'Cabaret', the production takes place some years later, when the thriving nightclub which was the setting for the original production has long since been abandoned and allowed to slide into decrepitude.

The production plays as a series of flashbacks flitting backwards and forward between the former, bustling nightclub of the past, and the derelict building it has since become.

The relationships between the characters are most enjoyable to watch during the Vaudeville-style duets. Jodie Anderson and Mr Dewar, for example, play a somewhat hard-up married couple who are celebrating their twenty-fifth anniversary and whose song, 'We'll Walk Up The Avenue' is a carefree and cheerful number about making the best of the little they have. Other excellent cameo performances can be found in Helen McIntosh's epigrammatic and suicidal woman about town, and her Russian boyfriend played by Calum Robertson, whose accent is so authentic it must have been borrowed from Chekhov. His ballet-dancing skills were also more than a little impressive, his character being obliged toward the end of the play to convince the police that his is not in fact a Russian spy but the principal dancer of the Bolshoi Ballet Company but is, however, unsuccessful.

Each of the solo singers handled their respective songs with ease.

The dance pieces are all of them extremely well choreographed, from the energetic and intricate ragtime dancing of the opening scene (and later the remix'd jazz and tap of the black-clad dancers) to the startling and hypnotic version of Cab Calloway's seedy and psychedelic ballad of 'Minnie the Moocher', executed by sharply dressed male dancers and Kirsty Cuthbertson, dressed in leotard and feathered boa, who captures the melancholia and seductiveness of the Minnie in the song beautifully.

It should by no means be overlooked that nearly every song was accompanied by the indispensable Mrs (or Madam) Nisbet on piano and the virtuosic Andy Scott on drums, both of them interacting with and responding seamlessly to the other actors onstage.

It is, of course, impossible to overlook the finale. If there was one performance which brought out every cast member's individual worth, then it was certainly 'Razzle Dazzle 'em', sung principally by the immortal Mr Matheson, with lines sung by other characters variously (Jayde Ritchie and Andy Scott even managing to squeeze in a little well-timed instrumental solo each). It was, in every respect, a farewell as worthy of the man himself as this year's 'Cabaret' was of the Quad Theatre Company's talents and imagination.

In the coming year the pupils will develop more business ideas that contribute to improving the environment in school and around the local area.



The Mathématiques Sans Frontières Contest is a truly European annual event involving tens of thousands of students from all European countries. Teams of students are entered from individual schools competing by age groups in National Sections of the Contest. On the day of the Contest the team is faced with a collection of 10 or more tough problems to solve. They are allowed 90 minutes at the end of which they present their final draft solutions to as many questions as possible. However there is a slight twist. One of the questions is presented in a foreign language and must be answered in that language. As a result the team not only requires top-rate mathematicians but also first-rate linguists!

This is the 10th year that Madras College has entered 2 teams for the contest, one from S4 and one from S5. We are pleased to announce that our Fifth Year team came overall 2nd in their category and our Fourth Year team gained a top ten place in their category. Madras athletes have had a successful season both regionally and nationally. Athletes from S1 – S3 won the Inter-School match against Auchmuty and Buckhaven in May. Also in May in the Multi-Event competition at Pitreavie Gold was won by Keith Simpson (S6), Silver by Catriona Scott (S3), and Bronze by Connor Hill (S6) and Emma Gordon (S4).

In June at the Fife Schools' Track and Field Championships at Pitreavie, 17 Gold, 10 Silver and 12 Bronze medals were won by the athletes.

Ten athletes took part in the Scottish Schools' Track and Field Championships at Grangemouth in June. James Tait (S6) won Gold in the over 17 High Jump. Keith Simpson won Silver in the over 17 400 m. Seven athletes represented Fife in the Inter-Area match at Grangemouth on June 20th.
