# **Bulb Selling Success**

Pupils in The Prince's Trust XL clubs at Madras College have just won first prize in a national bulb-selling program designed to raise money for schools.

The pupils in the S3 and S4 XL clubs registered with the Strathmiglo-based organisation 'Top of The Class Bulbs' back in September, along with other schools from all across the UK.

They organised the distribution of bulb order forms throughout the school and also in Hope Park Church, where the school has strong links with the floral displays each year. The pupils produced posters, banked money, made-up and delivered completed orders.

For every pack of bulbs sold the group make a profit and in total the £1100 of orders produced a £330 yield. This total was enough to put Madras at the top of the bulb selling class and receive a £500 bonus

The XL groups are now planning ways to increase this amount by using some

of it to purchase materials that they need to manufacture products for a planned Easter Craft Fair in the school.

Nick Pragnell from Top of The Class Bulbs presented the cheque to some members of the XL groups as well as the schools top two sellers Cara Crowe (S2) and Craig Millar (S4). Cara sold almost £100 of bulbs herself by knocking on the doors of her neighbours to get orders.

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In the St Andrews Day celebrations our singers performed in the service in Holy Trinity and pipe band led the torchlight procession and we just have enjoyed three very successful performances of Cabaret. Madras College has a justifiable reputation for the impressive range of opportunities it provides for all its pupils. I am grateful to all the members of staff who devote so much of their time to this very important part of school life. On their behalf I thank you for your continuing support for all we seek to achieve.

The other important development that is gathering pace is progress with then New Madras College. Doubtless you will have read recent articles in the press confirming that the preferred option is to locate the new school beside the University Sports centre on a site known as Lang Lands B. In educational terms this is undoubtedly the best option and brings with it many exciting opportunities. It is the intention that the new building will be ready for occupation in 2013. - During the October break, Ruairidh Tarvet (S6) took part in the preliminary round of the BBC Young Musician of the Year in the City Halls, Glasgow.
- A composing project funded by the 'Scottish Arts Council' and the 'Youth Music Initiative' has been running for a number of weeks with pupils from the Higher Music and Advanced Higher Music classes. Kenneth Dempster (composer, Napier University) and Ruth Morley (leader of the Scottish Flute Trio) have both been working with pupils to produce original music. The climax of the project took place in the Byre Theatre Cafe on 23rd November when all eight pupil compositions were performed to an appreciative audience.
- Pupils in the Singing Programme have been busy preparing for three separate events. Miss Burns conducted the singers in a performance of Fields of Gold at the St Andrews Day Civic Service in Holy Trinity Parish Church on 30th November. The Christmas Concert is drawing near, and the singers are also fortunate to have the opportunity to join with the

- St Andrews Chorus in a performance of Vivaldi's Gloria.
- In addition to an extensive variety of extra-curricular music groups, Mr Bell has started a Music Theory Club on both sites for pupils with an interest in the academic aspects of the subject and completing Associated Board Theory Examinations.

### Euroscola 2010

Ten times a year, the Euroscola programme offers around five hundred young people from across the EU the once in a lifetime opportunity to experience a day in the life of an MEP: multi-lingual discussion, voting and presentation in the European Parliament, Strasbourg, are just a few of the things potentially on the menu for sixth year Alice Tavakoli come February 2010.

The project comprises a five or six day visit to Strasbourg, the main focus of which will be the Euroscola debate, complemented by market research questionnaires and other related activities – namely visits to schools, institutions and tourist attractions.

Parliament officials head the event with the hope that each participating pupil will leave ready to take on the world with increased European awareness, sparkling French language skills and significantly boosted self-confidence.

Having faced tough competition from other Madras candidates, Alice can only wait for Rotary District 1010's final decision as to whether or not she will take an MEP's seat in Strasbourg as one of Scotland's promising representatives.

# Italy Sporting Trip

Fifty Madras College pupils said ciào to Italy in the first week of the October holidays. A group of promising footballers and netballers joined Mr Hepburn and Mrs Seeley on a trip to Lake Garda to train.

This was a great opportunity for the pupils to brush up their sporting skills, and that they certainly did. The boys even got an opportunity to play against some Italian clubs while they were out there.

### Yorkshire Dales and Pennines

Once again, a group of Geographers from Madras visited the Yorkshire Dales in September, travelling in 2 mini-buses, and staying in the Youth Hostel in Hawes in Wensleydale. The pupils were accompanied by Mr Bennett, Mr Clark, Miss Latto and Mrs Thomson.

We left at lunchtime on Thursday 17th September to travel south to Hawes where, after dinner, preparations were made for the Friday. On Friday, the Higher pupils were again treated to a great tour of Swinden limestone quarry, had lunch in Grassington, and then visited Whitescar limestone caves. The Advanced Higher group carried out rural and urban land use studies of the Grassington area in the morning and slope studies in the afternoon.

On Saturday, the Higher class walked through limestone scenery to study the surface features and the village of Malham, while the Advanced Higher went to the Lake District to carry out river measurements – the Lakes' rivers are far more suitable as they are wide and not

too deep to wade across!! They also carried out tourist questionnaires in Bowness-on-Windermere in the afternoon.

Each evening saw the group working in the hostel dining room to finish diaries, notes, maps and sketches and to prepare for the following day. Each pupil had to produce a comprehensive fieldwork notebook – there will be a prize for the pupil who produces the best notebook in each class!

Sunday morning saw the Higher pupils visiting the Hawes Creamery (of Wallace and Gromit fame!) to learn about the local Wensleydale cheese industry, while the Advanced Higher produced sketches of the River Ure.

# Positions Please for "Curtain Up"

# Eco-Club Just in time for Christmas



The Madras College Eco-Club have done it again! Just in time for Christmas. Together with the Parent Association Eco-Club, and despite the gloomy economic climate, they managed to raise the money required to build a state of the art organic vegetable garden at the Kilrymont Road site.

"We were fed up with the eyesore that was left behind when the old Support hut was pulled down. Weeds just took over the place and something really needed to be done", said Finlay Williamson (S3).

The garden was made possible with the help of members of the community and teachers from various departments. Fertiliser was provided by Mr Picking, a local farmer from the area. The St Andrews Links Trust provided 5 tonnes of the finest quality soil for the raised beds. Fruit trees were donated by the Fife Ranger service and professional assistance with the design of the garden was provided by Mr Lee Atkinson, whose company, Creating Eden, worked with the children and carried out the actual landscaping, once the go ahead was given. Expertise was also provided by Mr Matheson who helps the

school's Department of Additional Support and is a local resident and expert gardener.

"It's fantastic how everything just came together perfectly" said Mr Brendan Fox, the Eco-Schools Coordinator. "The enthusiasm of the pupils at Madras College for these kinds of project is amazing. They're really looking forward to gardening and have already started preparing for the spring."

The Eco-Club managed to raise the funds by applying to various parties at the same time till they had secured their target. "We'd like to thank the Fife Environmental Trust, ENTRUST, our Parent's Association Eco-Club, the Bell Fund and everybody who bought a raffle ticket to help support our project", said Katrina Himpson, the Eco-Club's chairperson.
